From the Pastor's Pen... "Growing as a Pastor, Part V" Excerpt from *"My Spiritual Journey"*



I was called to Mt. Calvary Missionary Baptist Church in 1986. The church is located in my hometown. My wife and I had know many of the members since we were children. We attended school with many of their children. Many of our classmates were members of the church as

well. The hardest thing for me was telling the good people of Independent that we were leaving for full time ministry at another church.

Mt. Calvary was a lively church. We called this type of congregation a "shouting church." We never had a dull service the entire three years that we were there. However, most of the members were older and treated us as if we were their children. And we were the beneficiaries of their wisdom.

The people of Mt. Calvary were there for us when we had our first and second child. They did all they could to support our vision for the church, and showed us "no little kindness." Just when we settled in and started to think that we would be there for the rest of our lives, we were called to serve the congregation at Union Chapel Missionary Baptist Church. Except for being a church that wanted to hold on to human traditions, Mt. Calvary was and still is a wonderful group of saints.

By the power of the Holy Spirit, we have been faithful to God at each of the churches where the Lord allowed us to serve. I count it a privilege to serve in the Lord's ministry. We have come to realize that it is not about the gifts, but it is about the Gift Giver.

When we first arrived in Huntsville, Alabama to start our service at Union Chapel, my father said to me, "son the Lord has rewarded you for your faithfulness." I still believe that it is faithfulness that God rewards.

We arrived in Huntsville in 1989 with a prayer in our hearts and a hope that we could serve Union Chapel with love and integrity. In all honesty, I can say that I had no idea, nor had I envisioned the place where the Lord has brought us to today.

In truth, I was just hoping to maintain what the Lord had already done through my predecessors. All I wanted to do was a good job.

My intentions have always been good. The Bible says that Job was "perfect," but this does not mean that he did not commit sin. In other words, Job was perfect in the sense that he had no evil intentions. He only thought about doing good, doing the right thing, obeying God. It is my belief that God blessed Job in his trying; He blessed Job because he desired to do what was right.

What can we learn from this? First, we learn that we are not perfect - we all sin and fall short. No one can live free of sin.

Second, we learn that God will bless us in our trying. When we try to do the right thing, God will bless us in spite of our imperfections.

Third, when we fail in our trying, God provides grace and forgiveness. He meets us in our failure and blesses us because we tried, because our intentions were to please Him.

When our intentions are pure, we learn so much more about the grace and mercy of God. It is in troubled times that we see how good God is, because He blesses us over and over again, even in the midst of storms.

Brothers and Sisters, God blesses us when our intentions are good. It is my prayer that we decide to do good all the time and by the power of His Spirit, God will help us do just that!

For heart health, simplify your beverage menu! HDL cholesterol, the "good" kind that protects your "Listen to your heart" is sound advice for relationships heart, as well as higher levels of triglycerides, a harmful

Research has shown a link between drinking sugar-sweetened beverages and a higher risk of heart disease, and many assumed that weight gain from the excessive calories was to blame. good old, thirst-quenching H2O! Add flavor with sliced But a new study suggests there may be more to it than that. In a new study, drinking 12 ounces or more of sugar-sweetened drinks daily was linked to lower levels of

empty calories, with no nutrients or fiber to slow down the effects of all that sugar. Do right by your heart, and the rest of your body, and make your main beverage citrus fruit or mint leaves.
