

### Wellness News

Spring clean you way to better health. Whether you're desperately disorganized or a neat freak yearning for orderly perfection, this is your season. As spring approaches, so, too, does the pull and promise of spring cleaning. Love it or hate it, getting your home organized and clean is good for your health. Here's how:

- You may breathe easier: If you suffer from allergies (and even if you don't), your home probably could use a thorough cleaning to get rid of dust, mildew, mold, and pet dander build-up. Use a vacuum with a HEPA (high efficiency particulate air) filter to clean floors, furniture, and upholstery. Tackle bathrooms, basements and garages too, especially wet areas.
- Your mood might improve: One study points to a stressful home environment messy, cluttered, in need of repairs, and failing to contribute to relaxation as linked to a depressed mood among women. Women living in homes that felt restorative, on the other hand, showed a decrease in depressed moods.
- You could live healthier: Order, versus disorder, can lead to healthier lifestyle choices. In one study, people who were put in a clean and orderly space chose healthier foods. Other research shows a correlation between tidy homes and higher levels of physical activity, although researchers aren't certain if the condition of the home encourages physical activity or if the cleaning is the physical activity. Either way, it's a good thing, as everyday, home-related physical activity such as doing repairs or yard work has been shown to support cardio-vascular health.

During Black History Month on February 23, Brother Willie Mack Craighead was presented an oil painting of a mural of four most notable Huntsville Fire Department firefighters by Fire Chief Howard McFarlen. The mural by local black artist Don Howard, City of Huntsville unveiled the honors the "firsts" in the Huntsville Fire Department (the first

African American, the first Asian, first female and the firefighter that has worked more hours than any other fireman). The mural is currently located at the Public Safety Firefighter Training Center located on Triana Blvd.

In April 1970, Brother Willie Mack Craighead, (pictured second from top in mural) became the first African American firefighter

and driver hired by the City of Huntsville. He was assigned to the main firehouse located on Church Street. The mayor of Huntsville at the time was Joe Davis.

On December 7, 1995, Brother Craighead received a Citation of Recognition by Mayor Steve Hettinger. In December 2000 Mayor Loretta Spencer recognized Brother Craighead for thirty years of faithful service. Brother Craighead retired from firehouse #5 located on University Drive in July 2001.


Shawn is the son of Tiffanie Byers and the grandson of Pam Byers; Miracle is the daughter of Melodie Morgan.

# Young, Gifted and Black Design Challenge

JCPenney is proud to announce the third annual Young, Gifted, and Black (YGB) Design Challenge. The YGB Challenge is designed to give full-time undergraduate students enrolled at Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) an opportunity to showcase their creativity across our stores and online platforms, earn a cash prize, and receive dedicated mentorship as they pursue their undergraduate and post-graduate goals.

#### 2023 Challenge Theme

Our theme for this year's YGB Design Challenge is **Black Legacy**. Black Legacy is the celebration and recognition of Black culture dedicated to the education, awareness and commemoration of Black heritage and people. As we honor our legacy and commemorate our heritage, we look within ourselves to ask the question, "What does Black legacy mean to me and how does it live within me?" Starting with the phrase "My Black is," challenge participants should use one word and accompanying graphics to describe your own Black cultural experience. The placed graphic or illustration should pay homage to the legacy that influences you or the legacy you hope to leave. Your design should be an expression of your Black heritage. Your solution to this year's challenge can be overt, subtle, abstract or literal but it must be a wearable interpretation.

#### Submission Details and Criteria

To be eligible, participants must be full-time undergraduate students enrolled in an HBCU at the date of submission.

Designs must be prepared in the form of digital storyboards that include the following:

- Inspiration
- Color palette
- Technical sketches (CAD or Hand Illustrated)
- A combination of imagery and text to demonstrate the mood
- Print ideas/Artwork/Technique

All storyboards must be saved as a flattened PDF file no more than 15 MB in size and no less than 150 dpi resolution. Please note, this year's design will be for a t-shirt and the fabric will be jersey knit. Entries must be submitted to YoungGiftedBlack@jcp.onmicrosoft.com by 11:59 PM CST on April 23 along with a signed consent waiver and release form.

#### **Evaluation Process, Selection and Notification**

The JCPenney Design Council, made up of senior leaders in our design, textiles, talent, inclusion and diversity departments, will serve as the panel of judges and will decide the winners. Finalists will be notified by **May** 14 and will be evaluated on creativity, innovation, ability to execute, resonance with the target market and relevance to this year's challenge theme. From the pool of finalists, first and second place winners will be notified by **May** 24.

#### YGB Design Challenge Prizes

First Place Prize Winner

- \$4,000 scholarship
- All-expense paid two-day visit at the home office in Frisco, Texas to shadow members of the JCPenney design team
  - Seven (7) 30-minute virtual mentoring sessions
- The possibility for design to be included in JCPenney's 2024 Black History Month and/or Juneteenth collections

Second Place Prize Winner

- \$2,000 scholarship
- Seven (7) 30-minute virtual mentoring sessions
